

This is something that Kenosha, like all police agencies, has struggled with in years past. The employees of the Kenosha Police Department have worked hard on several major cases this year and have provided quality law enforcement services to the residents of the City of Kenosha. It is with great pride that I can say the dedicated members of the Kenosha Police Department demonstrated they could rise up to those challenges; this was achieved without jeopardizing the safety of the citizens we serve. The community itself deserves credit for working successfully with the Department in providing information regarding illegal activity in the City of Kenosha.

Crime prevention has been a cornerstone of the Kenosha policing strategy. Community members in record numbers responded to the need to strengthen their neighborhoods. Neighborhood Watch participation is at an all time high. National Night Out, another indicator of citizen involvement, generated a tremendous response allowing neighbors to meet neighbors and celebrate advancements in watching out for each other. Along with our Crime Prevention Unit, all of these neighbors take pride in the fact they are doing what they can to make themselves and their families safer. Our staff remains very proactive in the community in educating the public.

In 2009, Part I crimes experienced significant reductions, we are particularly pleased at a 20% drop in the violent crimes as reported to the Federal Bureau of Investigation's Uniform Crime Report. The achievements of the Kenosha Police Department reflect the skills and dedication of our 209 employees. However, the police department cannot solely take credit, other organizations within the community assist in these achievements. One such organization is Kenosha Area Crime Stoppers, which is featured in this annual report.

On behalf of the men and women of the Police Department, we appreciate your ongoing support, and look forward to another successful year. Division Command



The Chief of Police, John W. Morrissey, is responsible for developing and communicating the vision of the Department. This office plans, organizes, and directs major departmental activities. The Office of the Chief manages relations with local, county, state and federal authorities and ensures that the lines of communication are clear. The Internal Affairs and Media Relations functions are also overseen by this office. The Office of the Chief supervises and recommends the hiring, discharge, assignment, evaluation, discipline, and hears grievances of subordinate department employees

The Assistant Chief of Administration, William J. Brydges, is responsible for various functions that support the Department's frontline services such as Information Technology, Fiscal Accountability, Personnel, Training, Fleet, Evidence and Property, as well as coordinating Homeland Security Initiatives and overseeing grants. The Office of Administration is responsible for coordinating the Crime Prevention Unit as well as the civilian

staff. The Office of Administration is also responsible for working

with and coordinating the activities of Joint Services.

is responsible for directing the Patrol Division, which encompasses specialized units such as the K-9, Motorcycle, Hazardous Device Squad (HDS), and Tactical Response Team (TRT). The Office of Operations makes up the largest and most visible segment of the Police Department with more than 155 sworn positions. The Office of Operations also coordinates the Investigative Division, which is responsible for developing information leading to the arrest of criminal offenders, investigating crime scenes, tracking gang activity, and coordinating the Forensics Unit.

Major Events

January 5, 2009 Officers responded to a fire of a mobile home in the 8000 Block of Sheridan Rd. Officer Pablo Torres and his K-9 partner Chico located drugs on the premises. Located in the home was 2.64 pounds of heroin with a street value between \$150,000 and \$200,000. Maria T. Guzman and Eliseo Rodriguez-Pineda were taken into custody for Possession with Intent to Deliver Heroin. Guzman has a February 2010 trial date. Rodriguez-Pineda was found guilty of Possession with Intent to Deliver Heroin in August 2009 and was sentenced to 10 years in prison.

January 7, 2009 Officers responded to a bank robbery at Southport Bank in the 7000 block of Green Bay Rd. Detectives assigned to K-Dog observed the suspect running across I-94 near STH 50. The suspect, Danny S. Parnell, was taken into custody. Parnell was charged in federal court with bank robbery.

February 8, 2009 Officers responded to the 8000 Block of Sheridan Road for a report of a deceased male. Officers found Marco Antonio Ojeda-Rodriguez had been stabbed to death following an altercation with his brother. The suspect, Nicolas Subdiaz-Osorio, was taken into custody in Luxora, Arkansas after a nationwide manhunt. The suspect was charged with 1st Degree Intentional Homicide and is currently awaiting trial.

February 21, 2009 Officers responded to Roosevelt Rd. and 30th Ave. for a subject down. The victim, Colin Byars, was pronounced dead at the hospital. Martin Walker was charged with Felony murder following an investigation. Walker was found guilty of Felony Murder on January 15, 2010. Walker is currently awaiting sentencing.

July 26, 2009 Officers responded to an armed robbery with shots fired at Shirl's Drive-In. Officers found Robert Wilde and James Hagelund, had been shot during the robbery. Wilde was pronounced dead at the hospital. After an extensive investigation Julian Miller, Daniel Gonzalez and Jose Leon-Nava were charged with 1st degree homicide and robbery. Jose Leon-Nava pleaded guilty to Felony Murder and Armed Robbery. Trial dates are scheduled for Miller and Gonzalez.

July 30, 2009 The Kenosha Police Department was awarded a \$170,000 grant through the JAG Recovery Act. These monies are earmarked for a crime analysis program, TRACS server, laptops, officer overtime, and an AFIS fingerprint identification workstation. In 2009, the Department was awarded a total of \$507,654 in grant money.

August 1, 2009 The Crime Prevention Unit became a full time unit when Officers Jeff Wamboldt and Ron Francis were promoted to the newly created position of Crime Prevention Officer.

August 7, 2009 Officers responded to the 5900 block of 50th Avenue, upon arrival officers found Carmen D. Santos-Padilla and Jose Leon-Colon had each been stabbed numerous times. Santos-Padilla was pronounced dead at the hospital. Leon-Colon was arrested for homicide, but took his own life in jail while awaiting trial.

September 9, 2009 Officers responded to the Jewelry Exchange in the 2400 block of 52nd Street for an armed robbery. Officers found that two subjects had entered the store and pointed a handgun at the storeowner. The storeowner had a gun within his reach and he fired one time at the robbers. Vernon Fields, was later located two blocks away suffering from a gunshot wound. Fields remains in custody pending trial on charges of Armed Robbery and Felon in Possession of a Firearm.

December 10, 2009 Safety Officer Dennis Walsh and Crime Prevention Officer Jeff Wamboldt produced a short video, a police style parody of the song "The Twelve Days of Christmas." The video featured officers and supervisors from the police department. Chief John Morrissey gave all department employees a copy of the video as a Christmas gift. The video was posted on Youtube and went viral with over 120,000 views by the end of the year.





Kenosha Area Crime Stoppers

What Is Crime Stoppers?

Kenosha Area Crime Stoppers is a non-profit community program, which involves the public, the media, and the police in a fight against crime.

It offers anonymity and cash rewards to persons who furnish information leading to the arrest of criminal offenders and the capture of fugitives. Anonymity overcomes fear of involvement and cash overcomes apathy.

If a caller's information results in the arrest of a suspected criminal offender or the apprehension of a fugitive, arrangements may then be made so that the person can receive his or her reward of CASH.

Callers are furnished with a secret code number, which is used in subsequent transactions. Some examples of rewards paid by Crime Stoppers in 2009 are 09-015 \$150, 09-021 \$200, 09-038 \$850, 09-231 \$150, and 09-279 \$300. Over the 25 years, Crime Stoppers has been actively involved in Kenosha County they have paid out thousands of dollars in rewards.

Kenosha Area Crime Stoppers also administers a program in the school system in which the organization supplies the Police Liaison Officer with cash so the Officer can pay a \$50 reward "on the spot" for information that leads to the removal of a weapon from school property. This program is called the "Quick \$50". In 2009, Crime Stoppers paid out over \$300 utilizing this program. As with all other Kenosha Area Crime Stoppers programs, the identity of the student supplying the information remains anonymous. This program has helped to create a safer environment for our children to attend school.

Crime Stoppers needs your support to enhance its effectiveness in our community. Be a part of the fight against crime. You can make a difference.
