

The mission of the Kenosha Police Department is to serve all people with respect, fairness, and compassion. We are committed to preserving peace, order, and safety: enforcing laws and ordinances; and safeguarding constitutional rights.

MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF: The report includes information concerning the department's organizational structure and statistical information concerning the department's activities during the year. With the support of our elected officials and the residents we so proudly serve, we embraced all challenges that came our way during 2014 with determination, keeping in perspective our primary goal to make Kenosha a safer city.

However, in 2014, we saw a slight increase in violent crimes 291 compared to 277 in 2013, which we are addressing by working closely with our "eyes and ears" - the community, specifically the neighborhood watch program and the walking patrols in the uptown and downtown areas. I am proud of the dedicated men and women of the Police Department and their demonstrated hard work and commitment to the safety of our city. They continue to work in partnership with the community to protect life and property, solve neighborhood problems, and enhance the quality of life in our city.



As Chief of Police of a place I have called my home for 26 years, I can attest, firsthand, that the resurgence of a stable police force is not achieved overnight or without a backbone to support the overwhelming amount of work necessary to achieve its transformation. Since becoming Chief of Police, I have consistently pushed my core principles of Public Safety, Community Engagement, Optimism, and Teamwork. In accordance to these guiding principles, the Kenosha Police Department has embraced the community policing philosophy. Today, thanks to the command staff that has

stood by me to carry out the objectives of a strenuous mission and our employees, I am privileged to offer the citizens, businesses and visitors of the City of Kenosha what I feel is a solid police department, and engaging community police partnerships thrive in neighborhoods. I am thankful for the productive collaborations established with the Mid-Size Cities of the International Association of Chiefs of Police and the Wisconsin Police Executive Group, which I have the privilege of serving as Chairperson for 2015.

We encountered demands of a service population growth that called for additional police services, impossible to provide without adequate funding, additional work force or resources. In response, our city officials increased the KPD's sworn strength by four officers, bringing our budgeted sworn position count to 203 and allowing us to augment our crime prevention capabilities at a rate commensurate with the needs of our city. We began to put the wheels in motion in 2014, to create a full time PEER Support Coordinator and Juvenile Crime Prevention Officer, both much needed for the department and community.

Statistically, Uniform Part 1 Crimes were slightly up in Kenosha in 2014 but overall total UCR numbers were down 1%, not as impressive as the 17% decrease in 2013. Nevertheless, our clearance rates were slightly higher (4%) than that of the previous year. While not a crime statistic, the City of Kenosha experienced only one traffic fatality in 2014.

The Department is directly involved in partnerships and initiatives within the community. These partnerships include the NAACP, which is our featured community partner this year. The Kenosha Police Department has always been proactive in its approach to fighting crime. We have collaborated with the citizens and businesses and have accomplished great results in pulling communities together to restrict the occurrence of crime in our neighborhoods and business districts.

As you read through our report this year, I hope you find it helpful and encouraging to know we are watching trends and issues both in our community, and around the country, as they relate to law enforcement.





<u>Homicide</u> – April 14, 2014 – Officers responded to 65 Street and Sheridan road in reference to a shooting. On arrival officers found that a vehicle had crashed into a porch. The operator of the vehicle, Anthony M. Edwards, was pronounced dead at the scene. The investigation revealed that Mr. Edwards was shot during a robbery attempt at 58 Street and 11 Avenue. Three suspects were taken into custody and are awaiting trial.

<u>Shooting</u> – May 21, 2014 – Officers responded to the 1700 block of 62 Street in reference to a shooting. The victim, 33-year-old Kavin D. Stewart of Kenosha, was not on scene when officers arrived, however, officers were notified that he was dropped off at Kenosha Hospital and Medical Center. A short time later Mr. Stewart was pronounced dead due to a single gunshot wound to his leg. The investigation revealed that the victim had accidentally shot himself.

Bank Robberies – May 30, 2014 and June 13, 2014 – Officers responded to BMO Harris Bank, located at 4235-52 Street, twice within two weeks in reference to robberies. The first robbery occurred on May 30, 2014 when a male entered the bank and handed the teller a note demanding money. The second robbery occurred in the same fashion on June 13, 2014. The suspect was arrested and charged with robbery and is awaiting trial.

<u>Homicide</u> – June 28, 2014 - Officers responded to a tavern in the 2400 block of 52 Street in reference to a shooting. On arrival officers found that the suspect had fled and a 31-year-old Gurnee, IL woman had been shot. The woman was transported to Kenosha Hospital and Medical Center where she later died. A photo of the suspect was circulated on Facebook and other media outlets. On June 29, the suspect turned himself in and is awaiting trial.

Structure Fire – September 12, 2014 - Officers responded with the Kenosha Fire Department to a structure fire in an apartment at 3007-85 Street. The lone occupant of the apartment, Roxanne R. Garcia, was located inside. She was unconscious and unresponsive. She was taken to a local hospital, and then transported by Flight for Life to Froedtert Hospital where she was pronounced dead due to smoke inhalation.

<u>Homicide</u> – November 18, 2014 – What is perhaps one of the most disturbing calls that officers of the Kenosha Police Department have ever responded to, occurred on November 18, 2014, in which a woman called dispatch screaming that someone had killed her baby. On arrival, officers administered first aid to the woman and her 11-month-old daughter, Serenity Rose. The suspect and father of Serenity, Russell Rose, fled into their apartment and set it on fire. He emerged a short time later and was taken into custody. The mother and Serenity were transported to Kenosha Hospital and Medical Center where Serenity died from her injuries and the mother was admitted for treatment. Russell Rose is being charged with First Degree Intentional homicide as well as other charges. He is awaiting trial.



The Kenosha Police Dept. is a diverse law enforcement agency with well-trained staff. The successes of the Kenosha Police Dept. are reflected in the way they carry out their day-to-day work, and the feedback received from the citizens in Kenosha. The Kenosha Police has invited the Kenosha Branch NAACP to have ongoing dialogue, participate in In-Service Trainings, and assist in recruitment efforts.

Newly hired law enforcement officers in Wisconsin are now required to complete 60 hours of college coursework, and successfully graduate from a Wisconsin Law Enforcement Training Academy. In addition to the Field Training law enforcement officers receive; the Kenosha Police Department actively participates in the National Alliance for the Mentally III (NAMI) Crisis Intervention Training. This training helps prepare law enforcement officers to deal effectively and cautiously with mental ill citizens they encounter when responding to crisis calls.
